They also formed this fledgling organization, in their own words, to "promote the sport of hunting with a bow and arrow and foster the education, fellowship and good sportsmanship of its members". Now, 75 years later, we are still enjoying the benefits of what they so carefully laid out.

There have been many great men and women that have been a part of WBH through those years. Folks like Roy Case, Larry and Shirley Whiffen and their sons, John Schoenike, Carl Hulbert, Val and Tom Williams, Ann Fancher, and Norb Mullaney are just a very few of those that have contributed – or are still contributing – to our success. Another notable member, acclaimed author and "the father of modern game management" Aldo Leopold, was an avid archer and an early and active member of WBH. Leopold, by the strength of his position and reputation, was very instrumental in convincing the Wisconsin Conservation Department to pioneer bowhunting seasons here that other states wouldn't even consider.

In 2016 we also embark on our next 75 years. It's hard to imagine that bowhunting in Wisconsin will experience the magnitude of changes than it has since 1941, but it's not unlikely. However, with your continued support, WBH will be here to meet them.
